TOUGH TIMES...

With many players who came through the youth ranks together, the Basque-dominated squad is a tight-knit group, but they've been struggling so far this term. Can they turn it around this evening?





BASQUES, TARE A BOUT







In 1989, The Royal Society Football Club of San Sebastian, to give Real Sociedad its full title, had a problem. Its policy of using locally born players nurtured through the youth system was faltering badly. Competition for Basque-born players with their local rivals Athletic Bilbao worsened matters, Athletic using their higher status and financial muscle to snare the best Basque quarry, poaching players from nearby Sociedad, Alaves and Osasuna.

Until 1989, La Real, the Basque country's second biggest club with average crowds of 24,000, was completely reliant on local talent. They only took players from the immediate province of Guipuzcoa, while Athletic were prepared to twist their own rules by recruiting from the partly Basque neighbouring regions of Navarra, or La Rioja, famous for wine rather than its Basque background.

Real Sociedad's strategy had stood for decades and often served them well. They are still eighth in the respected all-time Spanish league table, but the early '80s was their high point, bringing their first league title. League champions twice in succession, they also reached the semi-final of the European Cup. Bars in San Sebastian's old town – where numerous flags bear the legends like 'Tourists beware, the Basque country is not Spain' – still

proudly display posters of that side, immortalising legendary goalkeeper Luis Arconada, Perico Alonso, father of Real Madrid's Xabi Alonso, and the striker whose name inspired much juvenile British laughter during the 1982 World Cup, Lopez Ufarte.

When Athletic, with a world-class keeper of their own, Andoni Zubizarreta, matched Sociedad's achievement, winning the league in the following two years, Spanish football was again dominated by the Basques. Many in the region saw it as justification of their fight for independence. As arguably Europe's oldest race they had survived the repression of their ancient laws and complex language under the regime of General Franco, and now their sporting teams were triumphing over foes with far greater resources. Admirers of Peter Shilton, Pat Jennings or Ray Clemence may have disputed the opinion, but the Basques also claimed they were producing the best goalkeepers in Europe because of the defensive influence of their other national game pelota (imagine a game of squash with the ball travelling at over 150mph).

Real Sociedad were a big name. Steve Coppell chose them as opponents for his August 1986 testimonial, inviting them to Old Trafford for the only meeting so far between the clubs. The 12,826 crowd could have been

tter (though playing five testimonial games 1986-87 hardly helped) but they saw farte steal the show in a 1-1 draw. *La Real* on the Copa del Rey later that season and even't won a trophy since.

In 1988, under their Welsh manager John oshack, they finished second to Real Madrid, ored 61 league goals and reached the Spanish p final. A year later, though, the once umphant club found themselves suddenly, id unexpectedly, floundering. They'd slipped 11th position, managing just 38 league goals. Oshack left for Real Madrid and with Athletic baching their striker Loren, the usual lution, that of recruitment from the cantera uarry) youth system, offered no strikers of e desired class.

"We called a meeting," said a club okesman, "And we decided that the most iportant factor for us was a goalscorer. It was en that we made the decision to sign an itsider, the first non-Basque Sociedad player the modern era."

Once this momentous decision had been ade, Basque nationalism dictated that the itsider could not be a Spaniard. So they chose Scouser: John Aldridge, because "Aldridge is a killer in the box. He was strong, fast and blemical. We had to sign him."

Aldridge could never claim to have

supported Real Sociedad as a boy. Nor was he initially enthusiastic about moving. Three years earlier, he had realised his dream by signing for the team he watched home and away as a youngster, Liverpool. Aldridge had been the top scorer in the classy 1988 championship winning side, but Toshack recommended him to La Real, who offered £1.5 million and a salary far bigger than Aldridge's at Anfield. He took it, though he wasn't even sure where San Sebastian was.

That it is gloriously situated on a shell-shaped bay soon lifted the reluctant newcomer's spirits. The town's baroque architecture makes it one of the most elegant and fashionable Spanish seaside resorts.

"We couldn't believe it when I got there and saw two beaches and this wonderful promenade," recalls Aldridge. "I turned to my wife. Her smile made me realise there were good times ahead. I said: 'I didn't realise it was going to be this good.""

Nor did Aldridge appreciate the significance of being Sociedad's first non-Basque player for over three decades.


"I'd been told that they mistrusted outsiders and that you had to be Basque to be fully accepted but I wasn't aware of the importance at all," he stated. "I could see my name in graffiti around the town, but couldn't



understand the Basque words around it. When I asked somebody what it meant they got a bit embarrassed. It said: 'No outsiders welcome here'."

Aldridge avoided talking about the political situation, told journalists he was there to score goals and was welcomed by his new team-mates.

Sociedad have since moved to a new 32,000 capacity home, but in 1989 resided at the Estadio Atocha, a tight and inadequate stadium in the town centre by the train station, not dissimilar to Millwall's old Den. Cramped for the home team, maybe, but also highly intimidating for visiting teams. Aldridge performed well in front of sceptical fans on his debut. They weren't sceptical two weeks later when he scored two goals against Barcelona in the Nou Camp.

Aldridge bagged 22 goals in his first season, 1989/90, including eight in six successive games, a club record that has yet to be bettered.

La Real were so happy with his contribution that when he returned for pre-season training they had signed two more English players, midfielder Kevin Richardson (right) from Arsenal for £750,000 and striker Dalian Atkinson – their first black player – from Sheffield

Wednesday for a club record £1.75m. The three appeared together on the front page of Marca, Spain's best selling newspaper, standing behind the Real Sociedad flag under the headline 'Extranjeros, Si'. (Foreigners, yes.)

Borrowing Aldridge's textbooks, Richardson learned a few Basque words and phrases, which was appreciated. He, too, enjoyed his time at the club, as have the numerous foreign

players who've joined since, such as
Sander Westerveld, Darko Kovacevic,
Nihat Kahveci and the Russia midfielder

Valery Karpin, all of whom came close to leading *La Real* to the title in 2002/03, losing to Real Madrid on the final day of the season – an achievement which led to huge celebrations in the city of 188,000 souls. That was the last time Sociedad played in the Champions League, but last season's surprise fourth-placed finish – they played three seasons in the second division from 2007 to 10 - means they're back and the 5,900 travelling fans inside Old Trafford tonight are determined to enjoy the occasion.

As for those supporters who initially objected to Aldridge's arrival? They weren't so accepting of his decision to leave and held up "Don't Go" banners inside the Atocha.

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

Former assistant manager Arraste was promoted to the top job this summer after the incumbent – Philippe Montanier – turned down the offer of a new contract.

After a solid start it's fair to say the new man has found it tough going as the 2013/14 season develops. Early optimism, founded on an opening day win over Getafe and comfortable progress past Olympique Lyonnais to the Champions League group stage, has been swept aside by an eight-game winless run from early September up to the international break (this section went to press ahead of the weekend's visit to Valencia).

That's left Sociedad firmly in the bottom half of the early *Liga* table and without a point in Group A after two games, so Arrasate's last hope of qualification to the knockout stage is to turn around the team's fortunes in this double-header against United.

With plenty of Basque pride in the ranks, his side won't lack for effort in the attempt tonight.

he kids kicking a ball on the beautiful beaches in San Sebastian don't dream of playing for Barcelona or Real adrid. As the Atlantic waves crash nearby, ey long to follow in the footsteps of vier de Pedro, Mikel Arteta or Imanol irretxe – all of whom came through tiguoko, a junior club who often train on

Agirretxe, 26, is centre-forward for Real ciedad. In January, he came off the bench er his team had been 2-0 down against rcelona. They stormed back and he scored winning goal to make it 3-2 in the last nute, ending the Catalans' unbeaten run five onths into the season. Ahead of his visit to d Trafford, where he'd love to add another nous scalp, we caught up with the big no.9...

w does it feel for a local boy to wear the lours of *La Real*?

e club has been part of my life from as long I can remember. The training ground is 10 nutes from where I grew up in a village close Donostia (San Sebastian). I've always been a 1, I used to go to games with my father. My

idol was Darko Kovacevic, a big striker who scored a lot of goals in two spells for the club. We were winter champions [top at the halfway point] and came so close to winning the league with him and Nihat up front in 2003.

Describe the Champions League experience so far. Your qualifying games against Lyon looked superb...

They were great occasions. First, to win 2-0 in France against a very good team in front of our many travelling supporters. And then to win 2-0 at home to qualify for the Champions League for the first time since 2003.



But you've lost both games so far in the group stage...

We attacked against Shakhtar at home, had chances, didn't take them. Then we got hit twice in the second half. In Germany against Leverkusen, we played well. We took a lot of possession and scored, but lost to a goal in the 92nd minute. It's frustrating.

Last season was one of progression for Real Sociedad, wasn't it?

We didn't start well, but we got better and better. We played with joy. Our defence was the best in the league, just 29 goals conceded. For a club like ours to finish in the top four is a great achievement.

And you scored to end Barcelona's unbeaten run and beat Champions League contenders Valencia 4-2 in the best league game of last season...

They were very special moments, highlights which I'll look back on and relish one day. Barcelona is one of the best teams in the world, Valencia are a great team who had finished in the top four for many years. By beating them




[Agirretxe scored twice], we made sure they didn't, and both those results really helped us finish fourth.

Last year's slow start left you 18th after 10 games before the club finished strongly. Why do you think the club has started slowly again in 2013/14?

We haven't started well, but the atmosphere remains good in the dressing room. We have almost the same team, we have fantastic players, we have confidence that we can do what we did last year and rise up the table. We'll work hard and get our reward.

What do you know about Manchester United?

Manchester United is a team that every footballer wants to play against. I'm no different, it's a dream to play at Old Trafford, I was excited when we were drawn with them. I've played in friendly games in England, but never a competitive match against a big club. Our club is looking forward to it, the players and the fans. Many of our supporters are going to Manchester. They will be with us, singing and supporting us.

Athletic Bilbao were the last Basque team to play United two seasons back...

I hope that we get the same results as they did! They're the biggest rivals of ours – it's an intense rivalry, but a healthy one too. The fans get on well, they drink a beer together in the old town before we play them here. They always joke with

each other like any rival fans, but it's all good. Football is hugely popular in the Basque

Country. We're proud of our history and our football clubs.

Real Sociedad had to turn to youth after you were relegated in 2008. Over half the current squad came from the B team. You finished 15th in 2011, 12th in 2012 and fourth last season. Your project seems to be working...

The club had economic problems, so it was important that we promoted young players. But La Real has always done that though, it's important. I came through cantera [youth system] and made my first team debut at 18. It's a good thing, we're proud of the players who've come through, the local players who've realised the dream of playing for their club. But we also have a mixture of international players, who we welcome. It all makes for a vibrant dressing room.
